**Academic Reflections with Mrs Brown,
Deputy Head (Academic)**

Dr Kevin Stannard, Director of Education at the GDST told Deputy Heads last week that Guided Home Learning has been a drama in three acts. It is, I think, a suitable way of looking at the unfolding of this unprecedented situation and how it has impacted learning in our school.

Act 1, when teachers, students and parents were busy learning to use new devices, getting to grips with Google Classroom and Google Meet and getting used to the rhythms of working from home, drew to a close at the Easter holidays. The bustle, uncertainty and nervous energy of those early days of our GHJ journey already feels like a world away. In this period, students proved themselves to be optimistic, flexible, ready to take on new challenges and eager to advance their learning.

Act 2, the summer term, has therefore been a positive educational experience. Used to the technology, teacher expectations and confident in their organisation, students have thrived. They have excelled in end of year assessments; wowed us with their contributions to academic societies, competitions and conferences and impressed us with their maturity, diligence and continued high standard of work in lessons and independent tasks. They enjoyed the increased provision of Google Meet lessons (75% of teachers used Google Meet for at least 75% of their lessons in June and July), responded enthusiastically to the use of new technologies such as Padlett, Quizzlet and Kami and appreciated teacher determination to make lessons fun and engaging through debates, quizzes, creative tasks and even at-home science experiments.

97% of Year 10 students surveyed at the end of term stated that they were able to stick to their school timetable most or all of the time. 82% of Year 7 students said that their electronic folders were well organised. 82% of Year 8 students felt that their academic independence had grown in the period of GHJ and over half of all girls in Y7-12 felt that their organisation, digital skills, use of creative technology and research skills improved during this. These statistics all represent significant gains in vital learning skills that our girls should feel very proud of indeed.

As a result, Act 3, our return to school in September brings a wealth of opportunities. We are so confident that our teachers have quickly gained digital expertise that many of them will be undergoing Google level 1 training and testing on one of our INSET days. We are so thrilled with the confidence and

competence gained in digital skills by Y7-9 that we will be looking to build our repertoire of educational apps and encouraging students to continue to create content using technology. We are so keen to maintain the momentum of digital learning with our older students that we have decided to facilitate BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) for all in Y10-13.

GHL could never replace the warm, supportive, nuanced face-to-face interactions between teachers and students. Digital devices could never supplant the power and thrill of opening a book or visiting the library. Google Docs will not take away from the important skill of handwriting essays, poems and scientific annotations. But 2019-2020 leaves us a changed community of educators and learners and I for one am excited for all that 2020-21 holds.

Pastoral Reflections with Ms Ferguson, Deputy Head (Pastoral Development & Well-being)

We began the year with a clear message to staff and pupils to endeavour to **be 10% Braver** with a talk to staff and a beginning of term assembly; the mantra soon became widespread across NWC. With teachers and pupils asking to take part and deliver assemblies for the first time, girls stepping up in their leadership roles and new ideas being brought to the fore.

This term, in response to our GHL, our **Form Digital Leaders** were appointed- providing girls and teachers advice on digital platforms, how to use apps and applications.

The hot topics in the pastoral sphere this year have been **mental health and wellbeing, LGBTQ+** and most recently, **Black Lives Matter** and this has inspired groups of students to lead events for the girls and become involved in organising activities suggested by the pastoral team. Earlier in the academic year the NWC Festival led by the previous Head Girl Team was a resounding success and funds and awareness was raised for the charity Mind. Keen to **destigmatise mental health issues**, our current Head Girl Team created and ran 'Love Yourself Week' for the senior school- making it easy to learn more, to talk and

explore issues pertinent to adolescent girls; **school council reps** ran the **New Rules concert** to raise awareness too.

We are proud of our community spirit, integration and cohesion at NWC and can explore topics related to racial equality comfortably, and some of the students delivered a most informative assembly on **Black History** in December and our **Political Engagement prefect** has been active with a student and staff steering group in bringing Black Lives Matters and racial equality education to the girls and staff this term. Furthermore, Relationships and Sex Education is undergoing a metamorphosis and we are reshaping the programmes to reflect societal changes.

Our public speaking and debating programmes are growing from strength to strength, beginning with Year 7, we combine elements of the **Positive Project** with confidence-building through speaking projects. The fruits are beginning to emerge as we have articulate and self-assured delivery in assemblies. **This is a noticeable shift.** Our first **Great Debate week** has provided the foundation upon which to grow and build- and with specialist teachers joining the school in September, this all seems possible. Furthermore, the Drama department for the first time ran a successful **Speech and Drama Festival** and we introduced **LAMDA lessons** and examinations to the Senior girls. Ingenuity was found in helping girls who are our most reticent in the introduction of the '**Talking Project**' creating **socialisation opportunities** for conversation coaching in groups of Year 8 pupils, to break down a feeling of awkwardness in some pupils. And some of the pupils tried their hand at radio podcasting persuasive pieces around the theme of charity.

Our holistic approach is one of our great strengths, with the introduction of the **new tutor and co-tutor** systems in the pastoral teams this year, we foster greater team work for the benefit of the girls, bringing even more pastoral expertise to each form and providing a pastoral cluster around each year group.


We are now offering a comprehensive career programme giving girls in the Lower school access to **careers talks** (greatly facilitated via **NWC Connect**) and this was augmented with a fantastic **GDST wide InspiringChangeMakers** which was accessible to all of our pupils as a virtual event. This and the Limitless Learning courses being testament to the **pupil advantages reaped by GDST girls.**

Keen to engender a sense of **personal, community and global responsibility** in all members of NWC community our new **Eco Warriors** club was launched, with attendance at our **Exploration of the Environmental Challenges in the HS2 Project** extending to over 50 students- there is a sea change in developing a culture of curiosity and engagement in the pupils. In a similar vein there is strong interest in **Operation Wallacea** (Madagascar 2021), **World Challenge** and **Duke of Edinburgh**. In the pipeline, will be **NWC Earth Summit 2021**. **Charitable efforts** are significant, and as important is the philosophy of altruism- endorsed in the Positive Project activities. And in addition, we have contributed to to **scientific research-** COVID19 testing school.

It is true to say that **every single week since lockdown**, we have enjoyed pastoral successes through our pastoral GH- if success is measured as: **ingenuity** (pastoral events delivered over GoogleClassroom and GoogleMeet), **creativity** (whole school community events and activities e.g Giant Kahoot), **staying active** (live GM classes every lunchtime delivered by our PE staff, World Olympic challenges and Sports Day week), **camaraderie** (our head of music has asked for requests and we have year group **sing-a-long** each Wednesday), **compassion** (1:1 pastoral check ins with tutors), **empathy and sympathy** (writing letters to the Senior Citizens and our Thank you to the NHS video), (collecting food for people in need)(Thomas Franks) and finally, many moments of **joy and laughter** (Grand Masters competition, Toilet roll video, What do we do in lockdown video, assemblies)..... no other school will have achieved this under these circumstances. And it is thanks to our amazing Heads of Year, our fantastic tutors and co-tutors, to you parents.... And to your wonderful daughters who have engaged fully in all that is on offer.

All-in-all a good year and bright plans for the future.




Last week, Bhavini, our Sports Prefect, ran the first ever NWC Olympic Day!


Interfaith Event


When we are allowed to get together and meet up again properly - I know there will be many occasions in the future where I can come back and visit the school – I will hopefully see some of you.


Ela in Year 6 produced such creative responses to the Photography Club stimulus of Paths. Stunning photographs!



Anavi in Year 3 has given a lot of thought to a future career as a vet and considered carefully the skills she would need.




Beautifully presented and such neat handwriting.




Sensational Spanish


The Early Years girls have been busy investigating capacity. Their containers were either full, half full or empty! Great work girls.
